Should I hire an architect or designer for my renovation?

Whether you need an architect or designer depends on your project scope and complexity. For most residential renovations in Ottawa, an interior designer is sufficient, but structural changes or additions typically require an architect's stamp.

Do renovation contractors offer financing for renovations?

Why do quotes vary so much between contractors?
